
Summary / Description:

Leading tech companies acknowledge that gender balance among their employees adds value to their business and helps drive creativity and innovation.

However, a recent study commissioned by The Women's Foundation found that girls and young women choose not to study STEM subjects or follow tech careers because they do not see the connection between the theory they learn in the classroom and the contributions these subjects make to society.

For women, understanding the purpose of what they do is a key factor in the choices they make. This panel discussion will examine the factors that influence the career choices of women and girls and consider what both the education sector and employers can do to make STEM and tech more attractive to women, while demonstrating that a career in technology is worthwhile and highly rewarding.

Dr. HO is an experienced school administrator of secondary education sector, tutor and trainer in professional development programmes organized by EDB and various tertiary institutes on career guidance, general guidance, curriculum development and research methods. She is also the editor and author of the two career development tools most widely used by local secondary school students. She advocates in building connectedness among academic researches, practical applications

Dr Ho will discuss the following:

Gender stereotype exists, as evident in local empirical studies and our daily observations. towards differentiation aptitudes in and performance among boys and girls in various disciplines, especially those STEM-related ones. The prevalent biases have profound impacts on youth's learning experiences, opportunities given in school setting, and thus development of their career interests as well as decisions towards their further studies and occupational preferences. It takes a whole village, by building alliance among schools, NGOs and business sectors, to revitalize the education and social culture. Good practices would be shared which inform us with essential elements of success in instilling gender and career perspective in STEM education to foster equality and holistic development of youth.
